Dear Friends,

The Climate Change Bill is being scrutinised in the House of Lords, and is expected to reach the Commons in the next few weeks. But why do I write this? What has that got to do with us, the East Cleveland Group and our churches, you may well want to ask? Well everything really!

The environment and the concept of global warming used to be the domain of those who were shunned to the edges of the field of science, but now it needs to be the possession of every member of God's creation. At some point in time, and that point is fast approaching, we are going to have to accept radical changes in our lifestyle in order to begin to slow down our destruction of the ozone layer, and begin to reverse the devastating effects of our outpouring of carbon into the atmosphere.

In his film 'An Inconvenient Truth', Al Gore uses the analogy of a boiling frog to illustrate our ignorance of towards global warming. As in, if you put a frog into boiling water it would jump straight out. But if you put it in cold water and slowly turn up the temperature, little by little, it will never jump out and will eventually be boiled to death. (I have a copy of the film if anyone would like to borrow it!)

We simply have to take note, we cannot be ignorant any longer! But is it down to individuals to make small changes, like the great ideas advocated in Tearfund's Lent Carbon Fast, or is this too little, too late? And how do we get our government and many less co-operative governments around the world to make the huge changes that are surely needed if we are going to

do a U-turn and prevent a bad situation from getting any worse? And do we have a Christian imperative to act?

Well yes, our little changes are important! If a million Christians all switched to renewable energy sources wouldn't that bring a powerful message to electricity suppliers? And yes, we do also need to keep on pestering our government to stand up and be counted, to take a lead in truly beginning to tackle global warming. We are currently being asked to play our part in urging MP's to support the amendments to the Climate Change Bill (check out the URC website for our churches official line on the Bill).

And yes! Our responsibility to care for creation as outlined in Genesis, and as made clear in Jesus' command to love our neighbour, should also stir us to act! According to Tearfund, the world's poorest people have contributed least to our changing climate yet they are being hardest hit by the effects. Can we ignore our poor neighbours as they struggle with flooding on the other side of the world which is due in part to our emissions?

Kiribas, the first place in the world to welcome in the new millennium, the 2000th birthday of Christ, only 8 years ago, will no longer exist in about 7 years time. It will be under water, as a result of the rising seas. Let us realise that now is the time to change our ways, and so let us commit to bring hope this Easter to our neighbours around the world, as we commit to change our lives and change our world! Guisborough

I'm writing this in mid February, which used to be mid-winter. It's certainly been wet enough to be February Fill-Dyke. But my Fair Maids of February (snowdrops) were in full bloom in January and I've even seen a scattering of Daffodils. The Weather People say winter is becoming a thing of the past; who knows? But I hope we have at least a few days of snow with blue skies and hoar frost twinkling in the sunlight. We used to live in the tropics which didn't have much in the way of seasons. When it's hot and humid with periodic thunderstorms every day for ever; you find yourself longing for the succession of the seasons and especially the great carpets of spring flowers.

Do you remember The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity and the people who came over from Troisdorf? It's our twin town; it's in Germany near Cologne. Half were Catholic and half Protestant. What fascinating guests they made and they all spoke perfect English (I blush to think how few of us speak even bad German!). We were lucky enough to have Father Wolfram the Catholic Priest and Pastor Uli from the Evangelical (Protestant) church allocated to us. Both were interesting to talk to and both were hearty eaters, not to mention appreciative drinkers!

On their free day we took them a run through the country to Whitby. Cologne is a long way from the sea and of course Whitby boasts the potent mix of Captain Cook, St Hilda and

Dracula. They climbed the 198 steps up to the Abbey and the Museum. But they were particularly taken with the old Parrish Church which is so unlike any in their homeland. Then it was back down the hill to buy some fresh kippers at Fortunes, and on to lunch at the Sheppard's Purse. The aroma of kippers lingered in our house for days. But they were good kippers!

Another day while D took some of our visitors walking in the hills, I took Father Wolfram to see the Priory ruins. Plenty of churches have been destroyed in Germany, but unlike us they rebuilt most of them. Father Wolfram, with a twinkle in his eye asked at the kiosk if they had a postcard of The Black Monk. My children tell me every schoolboy knows someone who's seen him, even if they can't remember exactly who.

I hope Roger Wheeler has been able to include their letter to Ken Harris. And if anyone wants a copy of Father Wolfram's most excellent sermon at the final service I have one. He typed it up on this machine before e-mailing it to himself.

The Women's World Day of Prayer is being held in our Church this year with Donna Moore preaching in the afternoon and Catie in the evening. It would be nice if our little church so overflowed it wasn't practical to hold it here any more.

Building bridges between Troisdorf and our twin city Redcar and Cleveland Christian Prayer for Unity in January 2008

When in June 2007 three representatives of the Redcar and Cleveland Church Conferences accepted our invitation to come to Troisdorf and to visit the Protestant “Kirchentag” (a German Church Congress every second year) they didn’t depart without leaving an invitation for a return visit in the beginning of the following year.

So on 25th January an ecumenical delegation of ten men and women involved in different activities of our Catholic and Protestant congregations set off to take part of this years Guisborough “Prayer for Christian Unity”, including as officials Pastor Wolfram Knitter, parish priest for St. Hippolyte and St. Maria Konigin, and Pastor Uli Kramer, Minister of Johanneskirche and one the four ministers of Evangelische Kirchengemeinde Troisdorf. After a three hours sightseeing tour in Edinburgh our group had a safe but (because of heavy gales) a little bit too slow journey to Darlington. For this reason we missed the train to Middlesbrough and Ken Harris

solved resolutely our problem changing the direction of the hired coach and coming for us to Darlington station. So only about half an hour later our hosts could welcome us in Guisborough.

The following day the beautiful landscape in which Redcar and Cleveland is situated as soon as some of the monuments and listed buildings with an interesting history were presented to us — some of us went to Whitby. Others saw the Roman Catholic cathedral in Middlesbrough and everybody had a look at the ruin of the famous Guisborough priory destroyed by Henry VIII in the 16th century. Around 6 p.m. we met again for an “evening of encounter” with our hosts and members and representatives of the different congregations in the hail of the Methodist Church where additionally not only our spoken words but as well music played an important part: Anne Kordes-Pistorius, flautist and wife of our Protestant minister Dietmar Pisto-

rius, played harmonically (and without any rehearsal) together with Ernest Dale, organist of the Guisborough United Reformed Church.

On Sunday morning we divided again into smaller groups; we went to different services and took part of the worship of the Anglican, Roman Catholic and United Reformed congregations. The coffee and tea meetings afterwards again gave us the opportunity to get in touch with people we had not yet met before. After a previous concert of the Methodist youth band at 6pm in the evening the so called joint service”, the common Prayer for Christian Unity, began in the Methodist Church Hall which was filled well by a great number of people. This time the greetings from Troisdorf took more up than one year ago because Pastor Knitter had been asked to hold the sermon within this service. Telling about the ecumenical importance of St. Hippolyt, patron saint of our St. Hippolyt church in the centre of Troisdorf he found listeners who followed him closely and were as well interested to have a talk with someone coming from Troisdorf after the service.

Monday morning led us into a different world: Rev. Ken Harris, one of our hosts, had been in the service as an “Industrial Chaplain” for Corus-Steelworks in Redcar until a few days ago and so we got the opportunity to visit the Corus steel production plants. Everybody had to wear protective clothes and shoes, goggles and earmuffs and the weight of these things let us feel under pressure after two hours and strengthened our respect for the men doing a dangerous job for twelve hours at a time working in big heat and with a high noise level with really huge machines. Invited for a delicious lunch in the “Steel house” (the Corus administration centre) afterwards we learned more about the ecumenical “industrial chaplaincy”, its co-operation with

the Corus management and about the problems the staff in the factories suffers from and their pastors care about. Being back in Guisborough we met the two ladies who work as employees for “The Bridge” creating and co-ordinating its activities and looking after people who are involved in this registered ecumenical charity.

After such a very intense day everybody felt a little bit exhausted and only after a break we were able to enjoy the farewell dinners with our hosts in the evening — three and a half days had passed in no time and in the next morning we found us again in a train going to London Gatwick where our plane left in the evening and brought us back home without any turbulence.

What we took with us and will pass on in Troisdorf is one matter above all: the wonderful experience that for some days our hosts shared their lives and their faith with us in a very warm and hearty way, the experience that we were able to pray together without any impediment by barriers of languages or national borders and last but not least the experience that things are progressing better and easier if they are based on good ecumenical relationships and solidarity. We are looking forward to our next meeting with friends from Redcar and Cleveland!

Vision4Life – What will it mean for us?

Despite the previous day's snow and bad weather Susan and I made an early start on Saturday 2nd February to journey up to Monkseaton to hear about the next stage of "Catch the Vision", which is very well named as the "Vision4Life" - it's about moving beyond our structures to the nitty-gritty of renewing the spiritual life of the United Reformed Church, at all levels.

We opened with worship led by our Moderator, Rowena Francis and then went on to hear from the Rev Dr John Campbell about just what the Vision4Life has in store for us as churches and individuals. He was an excellent speaker and his enthusiasm was most infectious. He let us know how the Vision 4Life would be rolled out to us, briefly that year one, from Advent 2008 would focus on the Bible, year two – Prayer and year three Evangelism.

Each congregation is being invited to set up three conversations in the Spring and Summer of 2008 to explore 'the big picture' and their own local story about the effectiveness of the Bible in our church, the role of prayer in the life of our church and lastly, how comfortable we are talking about our faith to each other and to outsiders.

Following his outlining of the plans ahead we broke for lunch – provided by the host church, St Andrew's, which was excellent – there was even dessert!

Fully fed and watered we moved to explore looking at the bible afresh, putting aside our own preconceptions about how little or much we thought we knew about the Bible. What he was saying made a lot of sense; one of the things that he suggested was that whilst we probably have the most educated congregations ever, we are probably the least familiar with our Bibles.

We split into groups of 6 to look afresh at a particular bible passage, to try and see the passage through the eyes of one of the people involved. It was a real eye opener, it made it so much more personal and real, to try and feel what they may have felt – it was very moving. He made you so excited about what was waiting for you in your Bible that I just wanted to get home and to continue reading more and more with that bright new fresh approach. It wasn't just words to be read – "Oh yes, I know this passage, I know what's coming" – but a chance to look at it again with new eyes, to find something that perhaps you hadn't seen before. I shall never look at my Bible in the same way again and I hope that this first year will get everyone feeling the same, from our Ministers, to the Elders, to the members, to those who get the Group News or even just someone who happens to get to read someone else's Group News!
