Dear Friends,

Vision 2020; Do We Agree?

Ten statements have been put together at a national level regarding the United Reformed Church about the kind of Church/denomination we hope to be in ten years time.

O.K. some of our members will have gone to glory by then and others far too old to be very active but... this isn't just about US but about the future of the kingdom of God. What sort of Church, be it the local Christian community or the denomination as a whole, do we want generations in the future to inherit? So, bearing this in mind, do we agree with the ten statements?

As local churches we are being asked to consider these and to respond by the end of September. Then VISION 2020 will go to General Assembly in 2010 and we will as a denomination, hopefully, commit ourselves to working towards realising the vision during the next ten years leading to 2020... starting NOW!

Each congregation will then need to decide what its part is. This will go along side VISION4LIFE since, hopefully, during the three years of VISION4LIFE (year 1, Bible; year 2, Prayer; year 3, Evangelism), we will emerge better equipped to understand our mission and play our part. A congregation may agree with all ten statements and then commit to playing its part by focussing on one or two or a few in helping the whole Church to realise the vision

Please read and consider the statements, prayerfully and carefully so that your congregation can make a considered response before the end of September. We may decide to agree with all the statements even if we do not see that our role is to realise them all but to cover those most applicable to our situations. Other churches may then work towards realising the other statements. Remember this is a national initiative and each congregation can give to the whole. For some it may be to concentrate on prayer whilst others may play a more active role in turning the United Reformed Church around.

Ten statements of our mission and purpose

1 Identity: *In ten years time* every local church will be able to say who they are, what they do and why they do it.

We will know if we are on the right track by:

- The number of local churches with a 'mission plan' or similar strategy document.
- The number of churches having a welcome pack.
- The number of churches having an Open Day.

2 Spirituality and Prayer: *In ten years time* we will have grown in our practice of prayer and spirituality, nurturing strength for our witness in complex times, and developing our discernment of where God is and what God is calling us to do.

We will know we are on the right track by:

- The number of churches who have committed to taking part in initiatives to engage more deeply with prayer.
- The number of churches embarking on new ways of exploring mission and spirituality.

3 Christian Ecumenical Partnerships: *In ten years time* we will be more confident in our identity, valuing the *treasures* of our tradition, discerning when to seek ecumenical partnerships, and when and how to seek the further unity of the church.

We will know if we are on the right track by:

- The number of churches in Local Ecumenical Partnerships.
- The number of churches involved in working with ecumenical partners.

4 Community Partnerships: *In ten years time* we will be a church that is more active in the life of local neighbourhoods.

We will know if we are on the right track by:

- The number of churches running some form of community-project.
- The number of churches that work in partnership with local agencies, including people of other faiths.
- The number of church members volunteering in other community-based activities.

5 Diversity: In *ten years time* we will be a diverse church that does more to welcome and include all people equally.

We will know if we are on the right track by:

- The number of churches that have regular training to consider inclusiveness in the congregation and act on it.
- The number of churches that regularly monitor their membership and eldership to ensure inclusiveness.
- Representation of black and minority ethnic groups on all key councils, committees and task groups, at local, synod and general assembly levels.
- Appropriate numbers of black and minority ethnic ministers, church-related community workers, staff and candidates.

6 Evangelism: In *ten years time* we will be more confident to engage in evangelism, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom of God with friends, families and strangers, through story and action.

We will know we are on the right track by:

- The number of churches taking up the opportunity of the *Vision4Life* or *God is Still Speaking* projects for congregational development.
- The number of churches drawing on synod (staff) resources for evangelism for training and networking.
- The number of congregations planning and carrying out activities whose primary function is to share the gospel.

7 Church Growth: In *ten years time* we will be a growing church with an increasing membership.

We will know we are on the right track by:

- The number of new members in a congregation.
- Growth in URC membership by 2020.
- The number of churches exploring *Fresh Expressions* or new ways of being church.

8 Global Partnerships: In *ten years time* we will be a church that is an active partner in

God's global mission with other churches around the world.

We will know we are on the right track by:

- The number of churches with direct links with a church overseas.
- The number of synods linked to a Council for World Mission (CWM) member church or other global partner.
- The number of churches sharing in Commitment for Life.

9 Justice: In *ten years time* we will be a church that keeps faith with the poor and challenges injustice.

We will know we are on the right track by:

- The number of churches that actively participate in at least one Joint Public Issues Team campaign each year.
- The number of churches engaged ecumenically in action against poverty and social exclusion in their local communities.
- The number of practitioners and campaigners in local churches involved in a network around these issues.
- The number of synods that have endorsed and are monitoring the implementation of the revised ethical investment policy of the URC.

10 The Integrity of Creation: In *ten years time* we will be a denomination where each congregation has taken *significant* steps to safeguard the integrity of creation, to sustain and renew the life of the earth.

We will know we are on the right track by:

- The number of local churches who have undertaken an environmental audit and are implementing some form of resulting action plan.
- The churches that in worship, bible study and prayer give voice to the God whose life and love is expressed in all creation.
- The number of congregations that are engaged with people in their local communities and globally over issues of environmental care, sharing concerns, contributing the insights of the Christian faith, co-operating with others in finding more sustainable patterns of life together.

A Time for Creation

“A Time for Creation” will be observed by many British churches between 1 September and 4 October 2009, in the run-up to the next United Nations climate change summit due to take place in Copenhagen at the end of the year. The theme is “Creation in Crisis - a time for prayer and action”. The UN conference will seek to replace the Kyoto Protocol when it runs out in 2012; some are describing the meeting as the “last chance for the planet”. The ‘Time for Creation’ resources provided by Churches Together in Britain & Ireland will include materials to help churches, groups and individuals focus on issues relating to crucial decisions that will need to be taken in Copenhagen. In launching Time for Creation 2009, a CTBI spokesperson declared: “An international treaty is needed that will bind governments to drastic and immediate cuts in carbon emissions. However, this will require courageous and far-sighted political leadership to transform our economy and many aspects of our culture.”

Iona - May 2009

The island’s mystique and heritage, both distant and more recent, attracts many back to reflect and wonder-to community and solitude. Imagine the achievement of Columba sailing in a coracle from Ireland with 12 supporters in 653 to establish the monastic tradition in this isolated and windswept spot - or the vision of George Macleod inspiring a group of unemployed craftsmen and a few Church of Scotland trainee ministers to rebuild the ruined monastery in the 1930’s.

The Abbey, now ably administered by the Iona Community resident staff and volunteers, offers a 6-day programme through the season entitled “Gathering Place” when up to 45 guests are invited to live with them in community, participating in a lightly-structured programme with plenty of free time, and twice a day to maintain the rhythm of regular worship. It is made clear we are not here for a conference, a retreat or even a holiday, we've come to share in their community life, so chores can include chopping vegetables, setting and serv-

ing meals, cleaning tasks or helping in the garden.

Our week centred around Images of God in Art (based by Malcolm, the resident warden, around “The Christ We Share” pictures), Images of God in Music (with Laura, an exceedingly young talented interpreter and teacher of new songs), and Images of God Outdoors (a session with Ian, the gardener, who led us to look more deeply into the intricacies of the created world).

During the week there were options on joining the Island Pilgrimage, a boat trip to Staffa, a Big Sing or a Wee Sing, a meal swap with guests staying at the Macleod Centre up the hill, and time spent walking, talking and browsing the Community (and other) shops. It has to be admitted that travel does take a full day: five trains for some of us, plus two ferries and a bus ride across Mull- we travelled with three of our friends from ecumenical fellowship-but it really is worth it and is to be highly recommended (details and programmes available from www.isle-of-iona.com or by phoning 0141 332 6343)

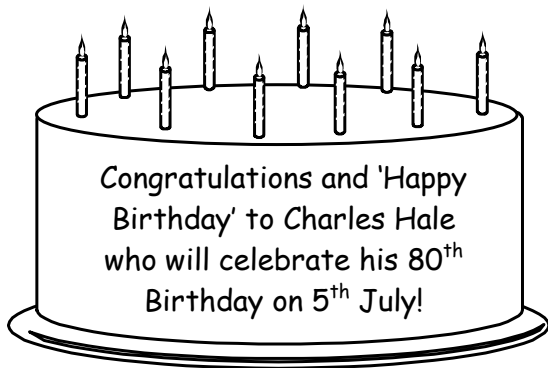
