Dear Friends,

Many people have asked me about what a sabbatical is. The word comes from the same stem as the Hebrew word for Sabbath which is the day of rest. It also fits with the biblical idea of the earth resting every seven years when land was left fallow in order to recover its goodness before being planted again the following year. For ministers in the URC this kind of prolonged rest, which is to bring about refreshment and nourishment, comes not every seven years but every ten. And it isn't actually a rest in the sense of doing nothing but is an opportunity to take a break from the usual demands of ministry and to engage in something completely different, to engage in an area of study or research.

I am actually overdue a sabbatical because I have completed 11 years in ministry but now I have plans to take the allotted time of 12 weeks in two parts. The first will begin on 22nd September. During that time I shall read around the subject of how the early Church grew and expanded and visit the areas of Turkey where the first churches sprang up. Embarking on a pilgrimage entitled 'In the Footsteps of St Paul' I hope to discover more about the background behind Paul's letters to some of those churches and also to discover more about those early congregations and their situations. And, of course, I shall have to produce some written account of my findings.

I shall return to ministerial duties in November until early in 2009 when I shall embark on the second half of my sabbatical when I shall be looking into the theological and spiritual development of children and their workers. I hope to enrol on a residential course on Godly Play which comes out of the Montessori school of thought. My guess is that this will not only give an insight into how children learn but also how adults can engage more with the bible and begin to understand much more of its many insights.

All of this I hope will not be about rest only but that it will be a time when I can be nourished and fed... rather like the idea of land regaining some of its lost nutrients. I would hope that I can use the acquired knowledge to enrich my teaching within ministry. I suspect that it will come into its own when it comes to looking at VISION4LIFE.

Money Matters

We have two Ministers serving our Group and we all know just how much work they do. Their salaries come from a central fund and every Church has to pay into this fund for all the costs of the national church including the Ministers' salaries.

There is a Task Group dealing with the very complex matter as to how much each Church should pay in order to reach a target for the Synod. The difficulties in calculating contributions from LEP's are truly mind stretching! The Group has had three meetings this year and the major part of the work has been done by the Convenor, Rev Pamela Ward and the former treasurer of Newcastle District, Ian Patterson. The days when Northern Synod could expect the rest of the country to subsidise us are long gone so for 2009 the Synod is hoping to raise £1.083m from 3700 members.

The good news in that the 2009 figures are unchanged for us. Indeed some have actually gone down. For our five Churches these are the figures now agreed:

Teesside South East Mission Partnership Leadership Team Meeting

Below is a selection of the highlights from the bimonthly meeting held at Guisborough URC on 3rd July 2008:-

Meg's Sabbatical

The first part of Meg's Sabbatical will run from 22nd September until the end of October. Dates for the second part have still to be arranged.

Future Mission Partnership Events

Mission Partnership Prayer Day: This will be on Saturday 29th November in the Friends Meeting House, Great Ayton.

Explorations course: Led by the Rev Dr David Peel, the Explorations Course is on 1st, 8th, 15th, 22nd, 29th October and 12th November - all at Queen's Park Church in Alma Street, Stockton-on-Tees.

From Our Churches

Guisborough: The four Vision4Life presentations, made during morning worship, seemed to be reasonably well received by members. There was active response to the issues raised - which was encouraging - and these are hopeful signs for active engagement with the vision in the next few years.

The Guisborough Bridge Association organised Hope 08 volunteer activities in the town during May - gaining a favourable response from some members of the public.

Tees Valley Ministry: The Rev Dr David Whiting, Stockton Community Chaplain, reported on a number of activities in the area. The following are some of the examples mentioned:

Celebration of Faith and Belief: This was reasonably well supported, although it did clash with Just 10. The meetings were considered useful and a report on the event will be given to the Stockton Strategic Partnership.

Street pastors: The pastors continue to offer a positive influence to the situation in Stockton town where they reach out to all people and give reassurance to the public at large. As it is a

Christian initiative the Council are not inclined to offer financial support: such help will only be available when the project is open to all people.

Asylum Seekers: The condition of asylum seekers in the area is of great concern to the TVM. RAPT, a steering group dealing with this problem, have made a number of successful presentations about the issue in local schools. The Stockton MP has also been involved in attempting to prevent unfair deportation orders being carried out. These people need to be in our thoughts and prayers.

Stockton: Members at Stockton responded well to the conversions about Vision4Life. Even usually quiet people contributed to the discussion and the feed back was very positive to issue of change within the church.

English Heritage approved a grant of £152,000 to repair the church steeple. This represents 80% of their commitment this year in the North East.

St Andrew's Mission, Thornaby: Now raising money to renovate the kitchen area and will be applying for a Synod grant.

Billingham: The members are in good heart but there are few people willing to take on leadership roles. The Guide group is very successful with a waiting list - and some ladies are making banners, designed by Margaret McKinley, and depicting the seasons of the Christian year.

Linthorpe: Members have engaged with the issues of Vision4Life but have yet to decide how this will be developed.

Lingdale: The church has a very small membership but the recent Children's Monthly Activity Sunday and services have been a success. Children attend by invitation and the June event produced 22 adults for the service - so it is most encouraging. There will be a day trip to Grindon, Sunderland, to see how a *Messy Church* works.

Redcar: In May there was a litter pick up for Hope 08 when 90 volunteers took part using equipment and materials supplied by the local

council. The event was published in the newspapers and members of the public were so taken by this activity that they asked people why they were doing it. This was a successful Churches Together initiative ending with a 'Rubbish Cross' that turned out to be a powerful theological message for those present.

There has been two years work trying to develop a Local Ecumenical Partnership, to help resolve the problems of the increasing cost of a large building. Prayers for money were answered with more people. At the present time the church is hoping that the building can be adapted to house the Citizen's Advice Bureau – which will help with finance. Vision4Life proved to be a challenge for members – who are now seeking ways to make it work in their situation.

Marton and Nunthorpe: The Worship Team took part in the services which presented the issue of Vision4Life. The four different services were well received and people were able to get ideas from each other in a responsive friendly atmosphere. It was noted that using the sanctuary for multi – purposes changes the atmosphere to advantage – and there was a feeling that this process was well supported. It was also reported that the Boys' Brigade did a car wash for Hope 08 and raised £82.

Synod Finance Committee

Jane Tomlin reported on the recent Synod Finance Committee initiatives. The following are selected examples:

Synod is now registered as a charity and this will affect all churches starting with those whose income is over £100,000 a year. Others to be include later. All assets will be transferred to a new trust. A new Synod Treasurer and Finance have been appointed.

The Grindon Project, at Sunderland, has been confirmed for a further 5 years – with Helen Stephenson there working in the area.

Jesmond: A large house has been let to the High School so giving income to the local church.

Trinity Whitley Bay Church is closing in July and will be converted into a community centre.

Synod Pastoral Committee

Deployment: By 2012 a significant number of ministers will have reached retirement – shrinking the total pool of pastors and requiring us to look at new patterns of ministry. This may require us to use SSM's (*self supporting ministers*) in an increasingly flexible way for various fellowships.

General Assembly

Synod Motion to the Assembly: "That we take a firm stand on demanding that all supermarket chains should treat their suppliers fairly."

Synod

The Rev Dr David Peel, Synod Education and Training Officer, described a number of significant initiatives taking place throughout the North East area, including where fellowships were developing seriously inventive ideas in church building. "Travel on a bus trip with me," said David, "to":-

Gosforth: On a prime site in the high street a URC Methodist partnership has produced a community centre complex including café at a cost of £3.75 million.

Alnwick: Sold part of a building, then changed this from a dying structure to something full of light and hope.

Keld: The manse combined with other buildings nearby, and with the support of the Methodists, to produce something new.

Thornaby Methodists: They have changed their main hall into a children's activity area and café – financed by selling land.

In all of this the message is: that if you have the vision and the will then the money can be found. Most money for these projects was acquired from other sources than church funding.

Margaret Ryder (1922-2008)

Margaret was born and brought up in Glasgow and when she left school at the age of 14, she became a secretary with the BBC. She met Johnny, then in the army, at a local dance. They married in 1946 and, eventually, since Johnny had joined the work-force with ICI, found themselves living in Huddersfield, where their children Linda den Riach were born. Later ICI transferred Johnny to Teesside where the family was able to settle.

Margaret and Johnny found property in Marton and she became a librarian. In fact, Margaret was very much involved in setting up the present library in Marton. But she wasn't the shy, retiring librarian who hid behind a book, much as she enjoyed reading. She was sociable and liked people and enjoyed dining with friends. She also gave to others in a voluntary capacity through her work with WRVS. This she did in the hospital shop or with the hospital library trolley.

In her younger days she enjoyed playing tennis and later took up golf which she enjoyed with Johnny. She was particularly proud of the day she achieved a hole in one! Keeping up her Scottish connections she regularly went along to Scottish Country Dancing. And latterly she enjoyed less physical activities but kept her mind active with crosswords, puzzles and jigsaws and she never tired of sitting watching the antics of the birds from her window.

She was a lady of great faith which was central to her life. She was very traditional in her views and tastes and she made an impact on others through her voluntary work and the ways in which she cared for others. And such caring was seen within the family when Johnny became ill. Her care for him was perhaps seen at its greatest in his latter years.

Each member of her family has his or her own memories of Margaret. Her daughter Linda remembers her as a special Mum and son, Riach, remembers her as always being smart and attractive. Grandson, Alistair, remembers her home baking and Christmas times at his gran's and has fond memories of her being a lady who helped others. Grand-daughter, Erica, remembers how she treated her and her brother alike; there was never any hint of favouritism and she is grateful to her gran for introducing her to Croft Original! And little great-grandson, Louis, thought of his 'big gran' as kind and sweet.

Her husband, Johnny, was something of a poet and he penned these words regarding Margaret so these are his thoughts on the woman who was his wife.

*My love she is a lambent flame
Burning steady, strong and true;
In youth when love was hot and wild
The flame though there was rarely needed*

*As we grew and problems met,
The flame of love was there to help.
The children matured and went their ways,
But still the flame burned strong for me.*
